GOING FULL CIRCLE

Isabella Bergamo is a seasoned Landcarer living in the coastal city of Newcastle. At the ripe old age of ten Isabella already has over seven years of landcaring under her belt!

Along with her family, she has assisted her local Bushcare group since she was two, helping to look after her local patch of bushland, the gully and playground areas.

When asked about Landcare projects she has worked on Isabella said "Projects in the gully included Clean Up Australia Day and National Tree Day. More kids from the area come and give a hand these days. I can teach them how to plant and water a tree. We have two other big days in the year and then I work with Mum and others in between".

When we get together as a group we get rid of weeds that are not good for the environment, pick up rubbish in the water in the gully and plant native trees, bushes and shrubs. The bush out the back can now be used by people going for walks and walking their dogs.

I have planted She-oaks and now the Black Cockatoos have come back because of them. Sometimes I count the number of species of different birds when I am walking out there. I plant Kangaroo grass too. If people cut down trees they should plant more in their place.

WIRES also came to see us about releasing an Echidna in our area as there were several anthills".

Increasing recycling to minimise pollution, protecting local waterways from bottles and cans and disposing of rubbish appropriately along with community education are all a focus for Isabella.

Isabella said "It is very enjoyable to plant plants and fairly fun collecting rubbish and working out what rubbish will cause pollution'. "I would like to see more people get involved to make our group bigger".

The Bush Fire Brigade helped to clear lots of Lantana from the area, resulting in natural regeneration of native trees and ground covers in the gully.

With the aid of grant funding, her local Bushcare group have worked to stabilise gully erosion and run off from an old colliery and neighbourhood

area, by establishing rock works. The upper gully leading to the bush is a pleasant place to walk, with filtering of water before it reaches the lower parts. A new play area on the gully floor also gives a safe place for local children to play.

Gingering up our Town

Since establishment two years ago Gingers Lane Tidy Towns members have worked to conserve and improve our local environment. One of our first projects ensured restoration of estate entry walls and signs. Walled areas were cleared of weeds, soil improvements made, mulch applied and new plants established.

We look forward to our monthly working bees - they are not just hard work but a good opportunity to share ideas, skills and some humour! With an initial membership of 23 we now have residents maintaining roadsides within the estate, on an ongoing basis. Our group is also part of Cessnock Council's Adopt-a-Road program.

It is great to see the wider community participate in our clean ups. A good way to get to know our neighbours more!

By improving our local environment we have seen greater indirect resident participation e.g. people mowing their nature strips more frequently. Keeping roadsides clean has also seen a reduction in litter thrown from vehicles, litter that then cannot wash away into nearby storm water drains or into Swamp Creek.

Now to complete our Heritage Trail plans for Gingers Lane to Bailey Park, which will include commemorative family tree planting.

SHOREBIRDS IN THE HUNTER ESTUARY

Over the past two years WetlandCare Australia have been conduction a program of community education, weed and fox control in the Hunter Estuary, for the protection of shorebirds. This NSW Environmental Trust funded project was a multi-partner initiative of government and community organisations.

A field trip and workshops for stakeholders helped identify and prioritise partnership projects for federal government.

A highlight of the education program was a Scientific Seminar on Shorebird Best Practice Management, aimed at bridging the knowledge gap for land managers and consultants working in the estuary.

Juncus acutus, Bitou Bush, Water Hyacinth and mangrove control on 25 hectares occurred at five priority sites.

Fox monitoring programs in the estuary saw 47 volunteers recording, on an ongoing basis, observations of fox movements and these were mapped to inform the fox-control program. Hunter Bird Observers Club also contributed shorebird monitoring statistics. Eight sites across six land tenures were identified for fox control with some 240 foxes eradicated. This ensured minimal disruption to shorebird numbers when the birds arrived (often in poor condition) and when they fattened up ready for their epic journey north.

Hosting of a field trip and workshop for stakeholders followed, to help identify and prioritise partnerships for Federal and State government funded programs. Grant sourcing is ongoing to ensure education, weed and fox control continues to protect shorebirds in the Hunter Estuary

Participants focussed on creative ways to organise activities, attract new volunteers, 're-charge the batteries' of existing volunteers, increase media skills and share a myriad of Landcare ideas and experiences.

Coastcare, Bushcare, Dunecare, Tidy Towns, schools, other Junior Landcare, university, retirement village, farming and Landcare groups were there.

How do you blend landcare with other activities? You could organise:

- A 'Youth for Lantana Bash"
- Sing as you weed and plant
- Family tree planting trees to celebrate your family 'roots'
- Spotlight walks with bush tea & damper
- Speed planting for singles
- Meet with another group at a National Park for a Ranger 'walk & talk'
- A local residents Spot the Bird Survey on your 'Landcare patch'

These 'blends' create buzz - great for media attention, attracting new audiences and keeping your volunteers interested. Buddy up with other groups - scouts, sports, business, cultural specific groups and combine activities to cross-pollinate interest.

Mix up your usual 'formula' of Landcare by changing where and how you meet and keep the buzz alive. Increase volunteer skills and involvement.

- Have a 'bring your grandchild' (or bring your grandparent) working-day
- Meet quarterly over 3 days for special projects rather than monthly
- Have a 'bacon and eggs' morning instead of tea and biscuits
- Have 'leader for the day' or rotating roles instead of committee positions
- Meet at the pub or cafe in full volunteer uniform to help share the buzz
- Share your story on what inspires you on your site and invite people along

Since hearing at the workshop about other great group projects in the Hunter, people have been inspired to 'pay a visit' to other sites e.g. Abermain Landcare and Tilligerry Habitat volunteers visited Thornton Public School's Lower Hunter Spotted Gum Ironbark Forest conservation project, with plans for Thornton Landcarers to visit the bay and Tilligerry is visiting Pioneer Dairy down south.
